

Omphalina umbellifera

Cap: convex, deeply indented (2.5mm) in the centre; 16 - 21mm diameter; minutely pubescent, slightly radially fibrillose; pale brown (BFF colour Sienna 11); with edges slightly darker and slightly striate, no veil, flexible; margin scalloped.

Stipe: cylindrical, tapering very slightly towards the ground; 17 × 1 mm; glabrous; firm solid; fulvous (BFF colour 12) becoming lighter towards base, with obvious pale base at attachment to substrate.

Gills: decurrent; concolourous with cap; lamellulae intercalated in two series; smooth edges, not crowded.

Flesh: thin; sienna as in cap.

Smell: Nil detected.

Chemical reactions:

Spores: not collected.

Habitat: on algae, lichen, on the soil surface, solitary and in small groups 2 to 3 growing in open Eucalypt forest.

Location: Green hood private reserve on Tully Park property near Stanthorpe. Found in open eucalypt woodland

Notes: *Omphalina* based on substrate, *umbellifera* based on stem colour. Distinguished from the similar sized *O. chromacea* by the paler colours and the presence of two series of lamellulae.

Collection examined: GIR27, Tully Park, Girraween, Pat Leonard. 15 Apr 2011; GIR36, Underground Creek Track, Ken Cowell, 16 Apr 2011.
