Leucoagaricus rubrotinctus

Cap: medium sized, 30 - 80 mm diameter. Dry, covered in reddish brown fibrils which may be washed off by rain. It is darker towards the centre, and has a slightly ragged edge.

Stipe: cylindrical, sturdy, with a somewhat bulbous base, $30 - 50 \times 3 - 5$ mm. Dry, creamy-white to buff. It has an annulus just above halfway up.

Gills: white becoming cream, crowded and free.

Flesh: white, somewhat fragile.

Taste:

Spores: white, smooth, ellipsoid, $7 - 9.5 \times 4 - 6.5 \mu m$.

Basidia: clvate, $30 - 35 \times 8 - 9 \mu m$, four spored.

Pleurocystidia: absent.

Cheilocystidia: cylindrical, mostly subcapitate, $30 - 55 \times 8 - 14 \mu m$.

Pileipellis: a mixture of narrow repent hyphae as in a cutis and wider erect septate

hyphae up to 15 µm across.

Habitat: Litter, in groups which may be caespitose in both rainforest and woodland. **Notes:** Other fungi with an annulus and white spores include *Leucocoprinus sp.* and *Macrolepiotas* which are larger more robust fungi.
