Pileus: conico convex becoming convex, with an umbo; 75 - 125 mm diameter; with a dark brown central disc and dark brown scales on a dirty whitish base; margin slightly in-rolled.

Stipe: distinctly clavate with a sub-bulbous base and narrowing towards the apex, hollow; $90 - 190 \times 8 - 20$ mm; glabrous. dirty white to pale brown; with a robust downturned ring which is moveable in older specimens.

Gills: free; crowded; white, discolouring reddish brown on bruising.

Flesh: white; staining reddish brown on exposure to air.

Spore print: white.

Spores: ellipsoid or amygdaliform with a prominent germ pore; $9.5-13.5\times 6-9$ µm, average $11.5\pm 1.1\times 7.6\pm 0.8$ µm, average Q=1.5; dextrinoid, smooth, thin walled.

Basidia: clavate; $40 - 60 \times 10 - 14 \mu m$; four spored.

Pleurocystidia: absent.

Cheilocystidia: abundant; clavate, sometimes irregular.

Pileipellis: a cutis, clamp connections present.

Substrate: in forest litter of Eucalyptus, Araucaria and of exotic coniferous trees.

Habitat: dry sclerophyll forests and forestry plantations and parks.

Collection examined: Brisbane Botanic Garden, Mt Coot-tha, Megan Prance, No specimen found in collection!

Notes: this large fungus with a tall slender stem and brown scales on the cap is readily recognized by the reddish brown staining of the flesh and gills when bruised.
