Hydnum repandum

Cap: convex but often irregular; 30 - 100 mms diameter; tomentose, felty; cream to pale apricot; margin in-rolled in most specimens.

Stipe: central or eccentric, cylindrical; $26 - 60 \times 15 - 30$ mms diameter; colour similar to cap but usually paler.

Spines: usually decurrent, crowded, tapering, usually held at an angle 10 - 15 degrees out of the vertical; white to creamy ochre,

Flesh: white with a pleasant smell.

Spores: hyaline, subglobose; $6 - 8 \times 5 - 6.5 \mu m$, Q = 1.2; smooth, containing oily drops.

Cheilocvstidia: not seen.

Pileipellis: not seen, but clamp connections present.

Habitat: found in rings and quite large groups in a range of habitats, often in rings, with Eucalyptus and Syncarpia hillii, common in south-east Queensland in early autumn.

Notes: a cream to pale apricot coloured fungus with spines (slightly out of the vertical) and a pleasant odour will almost certainly be *Hydnum repandum*. The redbrown capped Hydnum rufescens is also reported in Queensland.
