Hygrocybe hayi

Cap: convex, 10-15mm diameter; scarlet, with a slight central darker red depression,

drying to a paler orange, with a saffron margin; smooth, slightly sticky.

Stipe: central, cylindrical with slight tapering towards base; $20-30 \times 1.5-3$ mm;

scarlet at apex, and grading to saffron at base.

Gills: decurrent, widely spaced, deeply arcuate, yellowish.

Flesh: thin, saffron in colour.

Spore print: white.

Spores: broadly ellipsoidal; $9-11 \times 6.5-8 \mu m$

Substrate: leaf litter.

Habitat: hoop pine forests and wet eucalypt forests.

Frequency: rare.

Notes: there are more than ten red *Hygrocybe* species but only two have decurrent gills. This species is very similar to *Hygrocybe cantharellus*, but that has a drier, more velvety cap and narrower spores.
