Mycena vinacea

Cap: campanulate, convex; 25 - 40 mm diameter; matt; silky smooth; pale violaceous buff; radially rugulose.

Stipe: cylindrical; $50 - 70 \times 4 - 5$ mm; glabrous; violaceous at apex, paler towards

base; mycelia prominent at base

Gills: adnexed to sinuate; 30 + reaching stipe; pale violaceous grey.

Flesh: thin, concolorous with cap. **Smell:** raphanoid, of radishes.

Spore print: white.

Spores: ellipsoid; $6.5 - 9.5 \times 3.5 - 5$ µm average $7.7 \pm 0.5 \times 4 \pm 0.4$ µm, average Q = 1.9; inamyloid; smooth, some with a single oil drop.

Basidia: narrowly clavate; $20 - 30 \times 6 - 9 \mu m$; four spored.

Cheilocystidia: clavate with a narrow base; numerous; $40 - 80 \times 10 - 22 \mu m$.

Pileipellis: a cutis, septa with clamps.

Substrate: in deep litter.

Habitat: rainforest with Eucalypts.

Notes: this violaceous mycena smells of radishes. It is distinguished from the similar

M. nullawarensis by its longer narrower spores.
