Pileus: convex becoming deeply infundibuliform (funnel shaped); to 50 mm diameter; densely hairy; brown, with hairs darker brown and cap paler; margin inrolled. **Stipe**: cylindrical; $25 - 30 \times 3 - 5$ mm; densly hairy; brown with hairs darker brown

than background. **Gills**: decurrent; moderately crowded; often forked; brown, s

Gills: decurrent; moderately crowded; often forked; brown, sometimes with a faint purple tint, lamellulae present.

Flesh:

Spore print: white.

Spores: ellipsoid; $6 - 9 \times 3.5 - 4.5 \mu m$, average $7.3 \times 3.9 \mu m$, average Q = 1.9;

smooth, inamyloid.

Basidia: clavate; $25 - 30 \times 5 - 8.5 \mu m$; four spored.

Cheilocystidia: versiform; thin walled. Pleurocystidia: clavate; thin walled. Pileipellis: a trichoderm of brown hyphae.

Substrate: insititious on logs.

Habitat: in many different types of forest.

Notes: very hairy brown funnel shaped cap, institutious attachment on logs and brown gills identify this species but it can be confused with older specimens of *Panus lecomtei*. The species can be separated microscopically by checking the cheilocystidia, they are thick-walled in *P. lecomtei* and thin walled in *P. fasciatus*.
