Trametes modesta

Cap: semicircular or reniform, laterally attached; 20 - 30 mm diameter; finely tomentose or glabrous; zoned in alternate bands of mid and pale pinkish brown with a white outer zone.

Stipe: laterally attached, more or less oval in cross section; $3 - 8 \times 3 \times 10$ mm; glabrous; white or cream; broadening at point of attachment.

Pores: cream or white; round; very small, 7 - 10 per mm.1 - 1.2mm deep.

Flesh: thin, 5 mm; cream; strongly dextrinoid.

Spore print: hyaline.

Spores: subcylindric, allantoid; $3.6 - 5.3 \times 1.4 - 2.6 \mu m$, average $4.7 \pm 0.4 \times 1.9 \pm 0.3$; Q 1.9 - 3.36, average Q = 2.5 ± 0.4 .

Basidia: narrowly clavate, four spored.

Habitat: on a very rotten log in wet sclerophyl forest with a tall Eucalypt over storey. **Notes:** This specimen keys to *Trametes* in Hood and Cunningham although the pore size would suggest it might be in *Microporus*. Cunningham's key to Trametes leads directly to *T. atypa*, which is a synonym of *T. modesta*.
