Phellinus robustus

Fruiting body: a hard bracket which is generally semi-circular and ungulate (like a horse's hoof); 80 - 100 mm radius; surface woody, rough cracking to form squarish bark-like fragments when mature; margin somewhat blunt.

Attachment: broadly attached to the standing trunk.

Pores: regular, brown, 7 - 9 per mm; staining darker brown on bruising.

Flesh: hard, woody, ochraceous brown.

Smell: not distinctive.

Spore print: yellowish brown.

Spores: subglobose; $4.5 - 6 \times 4.5 - 6 \mu m$; smooth; somewhat thick-walled.

Basidia:

Pileipellis: trimitic.

Habitat: on dead standing trunk of *Allocasuarina littoralis* about 150 – 300 cm above

the ground.

Notes: this bracket appears to be characterised by its habit of growing on both living and dead tree trunks and developing a hard cracked tessellated appearance when

mature. It has been recorded under a large number of different names!
