Exoperidium: white, breaking into \pm 8 rays, somewhat recurved and trapping debris; up to 15 mm diameter.

Endoperidium: ovoid, pale grey; 5×5 mm; covered in white, farinaceous, fugacious warts

Peristome: fimbriate, dark grey.

Stipe: white, cylindrical, $1 - 2 \times 1$ mm.

Flesh: thin.

Spore print: brown ochraceous.

Spores: globose; $4-5\times 4-5$ µm excluding ornamentation, with prominent blunt warts to \pm 1 µm.

Habitat: growing singly in litter consisting mainly of *Eucalyptus* leaves and bark in an open dry sclerophyll forest.

Notes: the small size of this earthstar combined with the grey fimbriate peridium and presence of a short stem may allow it to be identified in the field. It differs from the smaller *Geastrum* sp by having a stem and larger spores.
