

Geastrum triplex

Exoperidium: pale buff with a pinkish tinge when young; breaking into 5 – 7 rays, split into 3 layers with a collar between the endo- and exoperidia; 30 – 120 mm diameter; to finely velutinate; not trapping debris.

Stipe: absent, endoperidium sessile.

Endoperidium: globose; grey buff; up to 40 mm diameter; tomentose.

Peristome: well defined, fibrillose, conical with a pale area around it.

Flesh: thick.

Spore print: brown ochraceous, yellowish brown.

Spores: globose; $3.5 - 4.5 \times 3.5 - 4.5 \mu\text{m}$ excluding ornamentation, with blunt warts to $\pm 0.6 \mu\text{m}$.

Habitat: growing in litter, mulch and garden debris in a wide range of habitats.

Notes: this large, fleshy, sessile earthstar is easy to identify in the field due to the presence of a collar.
