Amanita peltigera

Cap: convex; to 35 mm diameter; glabrous, slightly viscid; dark brown; margin faintly striate; velar remains as white flat patch on cap.

Stipe: widening towards base; 50×8 mm; glabrous; white; annulus absent; strong white bulb at base, with closely attached volva which none the less has a small free edge.

Gills: free; white crowded.

Flesh: white, unchanging on exposure to air.

Smell: not distinctive. **Spore print:** white.

Spores: subglobose to ellipsoid; $8 - 9 \times 7.5 - 8.5 \mu m$; Q = 1.1 - 1.3; amyloid.

Basidia: clavate; $35 - 45 \times 10 - 12 \mu m$.

Pleurocystidia: absent.

Pileipellis: a cutis of filamentous hyphae.

Habitat: singly, deeply buried in sand under *Allocasaurina torulosa* on the edge of Wallum forest near track.

Notes: this species seems to be characterised by its dark brown, slightly viscid, and slightly striate cap, a bulbous stipe with no ring and a volva. It does not key readily in Wood, but fits the description of *A. peltigera* well.
