Boletus aff dispersus

Cap: convex; to 55 mm diameter; dry, tomentose; brown (6D7); margin undulating. Stipe: clavate; 45×15 mm; pale brown overlain by a network of darker brown mostly vertical fibrils; exuding resinous droplets at base, possibly due to infection.

Pores: adnexed; small; pale yellow; not changing colour on bruising.

Flesh: white to very pale yellow in cap, fleeting faint blue on cutting, browning in stipe.

Spores: amygdaliform; $9.4 - 10.7 \times 3.4 - 4.6 \mu m$, average $10 \pm 0.5 \times 3.9 \pm 0.35$, $Q = 2.6 \pm 0.24$; smooth.

Basidia: clavate; $30 - 40 \times 8 - 10 \mu m$; four spored.

Pleurocystidia: clavate; thick-walled and septate; $18 - 25 \times 5 - 7 \mu m$.

Pileipellis: a trichorderm.

Habitat: growing at the base of a mossy trunk of *Corymbia intermedia*.

Notes: very like the European *Boletus badius* in appearance and close to Corner's *B. dispersus* this none the less seems to be a distinct species that could not be found in Watling and Li. Horak places this in Xerocomus.
