Cyathus olla

Fruiting body: large, broadly funnel shaped withoutward flaring of mouth, lip commonly wavy, seldom circular, 10-15 mm high \times 8-10 mm wide, no stem, grey or grey-fawn. Externally fine textured, not shaggy. Internally smooth, sometimes transversely ridged.

Epiphram: with a distinct and persistant white cap over the fruiting body (epiphram). **Peridioles**: large, up to 3.5 mm, commonly irregular in shape, < 10, silvery-white.

Spores: ovate, $10 - 14 \times 6 - 8 \mu m$

Substrate: mulch, potting mix, old wood. **Habitat**: in rainforest and parks and gardens.

Notes: the specimens found in SE Queensland have shaggy hairy exterior.

Collections examined: now 4 specimens in BRI
