# **Foray Report**

## Cooloola 28/2/2015 Report by Fran Guard

11 members attended, 27 species were found and 16 were new to the list. There have already been 5 visits to this area.

13 collections were made.

This area is rich in Amanitas and the specimens were shown in alphabetical order beginning with A for Amanita.

The first 3 could not be identified (using Alec Wood Key). There was the huge red staining one with the red stipe. Is this the Australian version of OZ "Blusher"? Photos were shown of this same mushroom collected on previous trips.

Next Arrhenia, a new genus for most people.

Then a kind of <a>Omphaloma</a>(?) with pink spores.

B for <u>Boletus</u>. <u>Boletus</u> No 16, red cap, yellow pores, pinkish red stipe, slight bluing of pores which did not last. Spores elongate and olivaceous green.

<u>Gyroporus</u>, brown cap, white stipe and white pores.

<u>Austroboletus mutabilis</u> red/yellow cap that changes with age. This was not collected which saddened Nigel. Jason has found this in Mapleton forest (Yandina side).

C for <u>Cortinarius</u>- roughened brown spores

<u>Cordiceps menesteridis</u> parasitising a cicada.

Finally an unknown Russula.

## **Members Contributions**

Jon Atkinson showed a collection of <u>Gymnopus</u> which were blue and growing in leaf litter. He was out with the Kedron Brook group at Chermside. They had been freeze dried.

Wayne who had brought in a magnificent collction- specimens plus great photos- showed <u>Agaricus augustus</u> which grows on wood. He contacts SEQ fungi while out in the field and often gets ID straight away. This mushroom is called the "Prince" and apparently the man who runs "Selleys" is interested in it. Wayne recommended visiting Ben Bennett in Caloundra.

James Hansen showed 2 boletes but they were a bit old.

A new member introduced himself. He is a chef and worked with the top 10 chefs in London and used to forage in Belgium.

The meeting closed and all enjoyed supper.
